"A library card gives students the tools to succeed in the classroom," she said. "It provides people of all ages opportunities to pursue their dreams and passions."



The Branch County Fire Prevention and Life Safety trailer allowed participants to experience the challenge of trying to escape a smokefilled house.

Children took turns experiencing the power of a fire hose. Friends of the Library gave doughnuts to participants, as well as fire safety materi-

Several service clubs were present including the Union City Rotary Club selling maple syrup. With their display was one of the two ice rescue suits they provided to the fire department, said Ray Batterson, honorary member of the club. All proceeds from the maple

syrup sales go back to the community, including buying the suits.

Scott Stevens, Union City fire chief, said they now have four ice rescue suits.

The fire department also invited community members to sign up for smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, that includes installation by the department.

Julie Baratta, librarian

of the Branch District Library - Lucille E. Dearth Union Township Branch, was pleased with the turn out. She was working with Sherwood branch library and Friends of the Library to host the event.

The community is very appreciative of the fire department and they show it, Baratta said.
