Bronson

Through April I worked with four teens through the Bronson High School and the Connect Effect program. These four decided on locations they wanted to place Little Free Libraries in the area so the first step was getting permission from property owners. Next was deciding what the Little Library would look like. One of the teens family runs Little Hands Garden and was able to place one on their property using an unused metal toolbox (the kind you place in a truck) He made a stand for it and said his family had enough books they could fill it to get it started. We did purchase one from the official Little Free Library site and this one will be placed at Discount Foods. The rains slowed us down getting it in the ground. Another got permission from his father who owns the Strike Zone to place one in the lobby of the building. The fourth one will be placed by Ryan Elementary School since there are a lot of children living in apartments in that area. Each of these teens will be the steward of their library until they are ready to leave school and then they will find someone to continue the care of it.

The Construction Trades program at the Career Center expressed interest in working with us to build some libraries but the timing didn't work out. Hope to work out something with them this fall. On May 6 the whole group presented their projects to the community at a closing program ending this portion of Connect Effect. Very proud of the team I worked with. Sidney, Aricin, Nicholas and Haylie great job!

Our Grab 'n' Go kits for April included Weaving a Flower, How to Write a Sonnet, and a Clothes Pin Froggie. Kits went very quickly.

Crafts for the month, Adults made a Clay Pot Beehive and Kid's made Cupcake Liner Flower Wreaths.

Kids place continues to provide two story times each week and three themed grab and go kits each month. The grab and go kits are always a patron favorite and are a heavily requested item. Some of our kits this month include for Kids; May Day basket, Mother's Day finger painting, and Bird Feeder. Our teen grab and go is a painted, paper lantern; and for the adult's glass charms.

Some new things you will notice at the Coldwater Branch is the community puzzle table located on the second floor, in the Adult section. The new magazine holders also on the second floor in the Adult section. Teen Space received some new computers and Kids' Place is receiving new iPads. Finally, the building has been power washed and is prepped for exterior painting to start in the next few weeks.

I attended the Union Township meeting on April 12 and shared updates with them.



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
