In Coldwater, we are jumping into new programs. The schedule is extremely busy and you can find something for everyone at the library.

September is library card sign up month and we are offering a drawing for patrons that sign up or refer a friend for a library card.

On September 1st we held our annual Spray Painting Event. Children, teens, and adults got to unleash their creativity by using different objects for stencils to design one-of-a-kind works of art. We also held a Take-and-Bake program for all ages. Library guests signed up for a demonstration on how to make a lasagna, then were provided with all the elements to recreate at home.



In August 5,740 people visited the library, that is a 37% increase from August of 2021. We also added \$2,990 in books to our collection. The Heritage Room had 63 visitors and has sent the local newspapers to Central Michigan University for microfilming. The parking lot was re-stripped at the end of August.



In an effort to spread the word of library events and services a table was set up at the school open houses for Larsen, Lakeland, and Legg Middle School. Jefferson and Pansophia were provided with informational handouts and stickers to promote the library. In addition, the library had an informational table at The Pride Festival and will have a table at Apple Fest.

A few upcoming events: Chair-ity Auction and Book Sale; for the Coldwater Friends of the Library, Saturday during Apple Fest. The Clothes Pin Wreath on Thursday, September 15th and story times every Tuesday and Thursday.
