Happy New Year! We are happy to have enjoyed the holiday time off and hope everyone had a lovely holiday season! We are ready for the new year and looking forward to sharing with everyone the updates on some of our goals for 2023!



As you have read in previous reports, we have been actively participating in the Grab 'n Go kits in Union Township with a lot of support from our patrons. For December, we provided Jingle Bell Ornaments for the Teens (12/5), Creating STEAM had Tissue Paper Christmas Trees (12/12), Painted Wooden Ornaments for Old Time Crafts (12/12) and the children got to make Yarn-Wrapped Christmas Baubles (12/19) to wrap up our 2022 offerings. The Spice Club selection was Ginger (Think Gingerbread!) and the Lit Kit feature was <u>Christmas Mice</u> by Bethany Roberts. We will be continuing to offer our popular kits and I wanted to give a quick explanation of each one for you. The Children and Teens kits are ageappropriate crafts while the Creating STEAM ones are usually available to all ages. The STEAM kits focus on one of the aspects of STEAM:

Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math. The Old Time Crafts are also an all-ages kit for those who are interested in a more difficult craft project. Each of these four kits include supplies to make the featured project, instructions which also includes a book list of related titles from our collection, and some treats like a bookmark and a piece of candy. The Spice Club kits are more focused on being used for educational purposes and include samples of the featured spice, information about the spice, a recipe using the spice and a list of cookbooks in our collection that include recipes that use the spice. The Lit Kits are for families to share the love of reading and bring the stories to life through the five aspects of early literacy: Talk, Sing, Read, Write and Play. The kit includes a free book, an activity sheet with each aspect represented, a craft (supplies included), and treats.



We were honored to have been chosen by the Rosemary Smitley family to receive memorial money after Mrs. Smitley passed away on December 5, 2022. The total is \$580 and will be used to replace the Magic Tree House series along with the non-fiction companion books.

She taught second grade and was a Brownie leader so we also got a copy of a biography about Juliette Gordon Low, the founder of the Girl Scouts. I am looking to get a few character toys representing favorite literary figures to display. I have talked to her daughterin-law who was pleased with the plans made for the memorial money. I will share pictures when I receive those items. A special thanks to all who donated to the library in honor of this special lady!

We had several participate in our annual "So This is Quizmas..." event and enjoyed looking through the holiday books on display which included stories about Christmas, Hanukkah, and other traditions of the season. For decorations during the holidays, we had a Christmas tree with bookmark ornaments along with the Grinch stealing an ornament in the children's area.



An additional tree was set up by the Roots and Shoots Seed Library and the ornaments on that one were seed packets from donated seeds.
