# Friends of the Library

The Annual Combined Friends meeting was hosted on April 22 by the Union Twp. Friends of the Library. The event was well attended, with about 20 people there representing all district Friends groups except for Coldwater, who did sent a written report. It was a lovely evening of sharing, along with some fun games and prizes for those in attendance. We also brought the bookmobile to the event and gave those present a preview.

#### MLA Advocacy Day

A few days before our actual launch, we had a soft launch at MLA's Advocacy Day. BDL joined a long line of about a dozen bookmobiles to park in front of the State Capitol to raise awareness of all the good going on in our libraries. For our part, this was also an excellent time to talk with a bunch of library professionals operating bookmobiles and learn from them. Over 200 people visited our vehicle, including a representative from State Senator Lindsey's office.



One of MLA's goals for the day was to secure more funding for MeLCat in the upcoming state budget, but there didn't seem to be much reception for this. Indeed, in a recent budget draft, while State Aid to libraries has gone up by a small amount, direct funding to the library of Michigan was actually lowered for the next fiscal year.

# **Facilities**

BDL was closed to the public on April 28 for our annual spring cleanup in-service day. We started the day all got together for a brief meet-up with our new MERS representatives for an education session on participating in retirement savings. Then we took a moment to celebrate our three colleagues who are about to welcome their new bundles of joy.

After that, we split up to do a number of projects, with some Coldwater/District staff traveling to branches to aid their efforts. Some highlights include:

- program supply prep and maintenance on Playaways and VOXBooks at Bronson
- shelf reading and organizing the collection at Quincy
- weeding and organizing the cupboards at Sherwood
- dusting all the lights and shelves as well as going through the cupboards and storage at Union Twp.
- and many, many jobs at the Coldwater branch in and out, including a Herculean task by Christina to organize and clean the Library of Things storage room
- I helped Curtis organized IT supplies and the server room

At the Coldwater Branch, the barriers approved in January for the front porch and east entrance were installed and look great (pictures in Christina's report). Foulke Construction said it will be a while yet before they can do the sidewalk repair the Board approved,

At the Union Twp. Branch, with the permission of the Township, Curtis and I installed a door to the manager's office to provide some privacy for upcoming maternity needs.

# **IMLS News**

On April 24, I attended a special meeting for directors with the Library of Michigan about the ongoing events with funding from IMLS and the prospect of IMLS being cut entirely. At this point, it does look like IMLS will be providing some funding, just not the full, expected amount. Library of Michigan staff believe that they can fully fund the interlibrary loan portion of MeLCat, but that the MeL databases might have to be dramatically cut. If so, this would be a great hit, not just to libraries, but to schools and Michigan residents who heavily use the databases. Current services are funded through the end of the State's fiscal year, so no changes are expected until October 1.

The State of Michigan is participating in a lawsuit over the cuts to IMLS, and <u>a federal judge</u> <u>has issued a preliminary injunction blocking the cuts</u>. This is an ongoing situation, and I'm sure there will be be more to report in the future!

### **IT Department**

I had a walkthrough of the Sherwood Branch with site engineers from Frontier for our upcoming fiber optic installation there. Some work will be required by us so that Frontier can bring the connection into the building. We received permission from the Village Board and have secured Ludwick Electric to do this work. Frontier's installation should be by mid July.

#### **Evergreen Conference**

I attended this year's Evergreen conference May 12-14 to learn about the latest for our library circulation software. This year the conference was online, and attended by several hundred people. I attended sessions on making the best use of automated notices, data reporting, batch processing options, better utilizing custom data fields on both patron and item records, new patron-facing front end options, kid's catalog, what's new in the latest Evergreen versions, new support for 3<sup>rd</sup> party vendors, cataloging foreign-language titles, supporting the latest cataloging standards, The Evergreen Project strategic plan update, and more. It was a GREAT conference and my brain is overflowing with great new Evergreen information. Now to just find time to implement my inspiration!
