## Outreach

Happy New Year! It may not seem like much has happened at the bookmobile this past month with holiday closures and the cold weather, but there is still quite a bit going on behind the scenes.

We had to cancel the bookmobile's route for a week in December due to a dead chassis battery thanks to the winter weather. Luckily, we did not have much scheduled that week. We are taking steps to avoid this happening again in the future. We also sent the vehicle in for some regular maintenance on the Odyne battery system just after the start of the year (without any disruption to our stop schedule).

We also saw an uptick in our attendance at our Butler stop last month with 10 attendees, all of whom were Amish! A few new library cards were created, and now we have a pretty steady attendance of at least 5 regular patrons in the area.

The first order of the year for new materials has already been submitted! This feels a little different from last year, as we now have a bigger audience and a better idea of what of what they like and look for. Some books have already been steadily pulled off the shelves throughout the past year in order to make space for newer ones. Most of these have not yet been checked out, so I feel confident in being able to place these into storage. These items will be listed as "in storage" in the library catalog, but can still be requested by patrons.

Speaking of new materials, I plan to put a little more focus on purchasing accessible materials in 2026. I will be adding a few kids titles in Spanish to my orders, and will be keeping an eye out for when the Lois Lenski Covey grant opens for submissions. This was a grant I applied for a couple of years ago and was awarded \$2500. It is specifically for libraries with bookmobiles. Awarded funds are used solely for purchasing more kids materials, and the maximum award is \$5000. I hope to use this for some of the more costly kids materials like Vox books and Large Print.

At the very end of 2025, I applied for the Stephen T. Reidner Grant for Life Enhancing Library Programs for People Living with Dementia. One of the things I've learned through my time at ABOS conferences is that people living with Dementia (except for probably in late stages of the disease) can still read. They read differently than we do, but the act of reading itself is more of an automatic muscle-memory action. This grant is designed for libraries who do not already have any materials or programming in place for this specific community demographic. There are 2 companies I've seen at ABOS who provide products that some libraries have cataloged and available for checkout in their collections. One of which is Reading2Connect, who makes books geared towards adults living with dementia.
