Branch Manager's Message

This month we celebrate National Library Week! April 10-16 is our time to shine! First sponsored in 1958, National Library Week is a national observance sponsored by the American Library Association (ALA) and libraries across the country each April. It is a time to celebrate the contributions of our nation's libraries and to promote library use and support. All types of libraries like schools, public and academic participate.

In the mid-1950s research showed that Americans were spending less on books and more on radios, television and musical instruments. Concerned that Americans were reading less, the American Library Association and the American Book Committee in 1954. The committee's goals were ambitious. They ranged from "encouraging people to read in their increasing leisure time" to "improving incomes and health" and "developing strong and happy family life". In 1957, the committee developed a plan for the National Library Week based on the idea that once people were motivated to read, they would support and use libraries. With the cooperation of ALA and with the help from the Advertising Council, the first National Library Week was observed in 1958 with the theme "Wake Up and Read!"

The next year, the ALA voted to continue the annual celebration. The National Book Committee was disbanded in 1974 so the ALA assumed full sponsorship.

We at the Quincy Library appreciate our loyal patrons very much. We enjoy your visits, your requests and donation you give us. Without your support, this wonderful building would not be thriving as it is today.

In the 1970s, Library Book Detective Harry Singleton tracked down long overdue books by making "house calls". In 1976, he collected and returned \$26,000 worth of books.

He will be putting together a book called 'From Moccasins to Main Street'. He made digital copies of old post cards and also copied information from our genealogy department. He complimented the library on the historical and reference areas and was very pleased with the amount of useful information he was able to gather during his visit.

Virginia Brown donated thirty years of Quincy Library High School annuals to our reference / genealogy area. We were very happy to receive this gift as our collection had several years missing.

The food gathered in December during Library Amnesty month was given to the Sonshine Food Pantry at the Union Church here in Quincy. The food pantry really appreciated the donation.

The Board felt it would be a good idea to send a letter to our patrons and to those who live away but are interested in our library, reminding them of what we have been able to accomplish in the last few years through their donations. Since Library Week falls in the month of April, hopefully you have received this letter. Donations and grants have made it possible to update the library and make it a nicer place to be and to serve the community and our patrons the very best we can.


