

# From the Quincy Library Board Judy Dobson, Secretary

In May, Renee celebrated her 20th year working at the Quincy Library. She has lasted through five librarians and a smooth transition from one to another was made possible because of Renee and her knowledge of the library. Congratulations, again Renee.

The outside flag spotlight was out of commission for a while. Something fried the wiring so a new one was installed in July by Kaiser Electric.

Donations to the library in memory of Gerry Smith will be used for purchasing two bronze children's statues that will be placed on display in the Children's Room. The rest of the money will be used for books or for other items also mentioned by the family. The donations made "in memory of" really benefit the library and we gratefully acknowledged all of them.

Mr. Howard Streeter was contacted by the Board to help us determine what we have and what we should do with the items in the wall display case hanging over the stairway in the entry. Mr. Streeter has a passion for the Civil War and is very knowledgeable in artifacts of that time.

He told the Board that we should be very proud as he thought no other town in Michigan has what we have in our library (i.e. a federal flag of Civil War era used for parades and a Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) flag of the Loomis battery). We also have the GAR roster, in good shape, at the library that can be viewed if requested. He showed us where the flags are self-destructing from hanging and from light. He suggested we get someone to put several hinges or a piano hinge on the case so it could be opened without dropping the glass front. The items could then be removed.

Each flag needs to be stored flat in a specially made acid-free, sealed container. Where the Board will go from here, we are not sure. Is anyone out there who has the time and/or willingness to help us decide where to keep these flags in the library and help construct their acid-free, sealed containers? We feel we are in over our heads, but now know we have some very valuable items that must be preserved.

Mr. Streeter feels the muskets in the case were of the Civil War era but the swords probably were issued after the war. The Board is truly indebted to Howard Streeter for helping us out and for the history he was able to tell us concerning the Loomis Battery and the cannons once on display at Battery Park.

### Looking Back...

In the Quincy Library minutes of the September 1913, these expenses were noted: paid Maude Barnes, Librarian \$10.00; Florence Campbell, Assistant, \$4.00; Books, \$37.62; and lawn mowed \$2.00. Overdue fines \$4.05 with an average of 30 books checked out per day. Interesting to note that Maude Barnes was the first Librarian at the Quincy Library and served from 1912 through 1920.

Advertisements in the 1913 Quincy Herald, featured Ruffled Curtains for 25 cents per pair; coffee at 28 cents per pound; bread at 5 -10 cents and graham crackers at 7 cents.

#### Policy as to library patrons:

"Upon signing with satisfaction surety an agreement to observe all the rules and regulations made for the government and safety of the Library, whether now in force or hereafter...persons unable to provide sureties may have the same privilege by making a deposit of 50% in excess to value of book desired as security, which money to be refunded when the book is returned in as good a shape as when taken out."

#### Did You Know?

...that the library has a framed panoramic view of Quincy from 1833? Points of interest are the Donovan & Conley's Opera Hall, churches, Commercial Hotel, Dr. F.E. Marsh's Sanitarium for Opium Habit, G.W. Dean's Carriage Wagon and Sleigh Manufacturing and other businesses from this era. ..Roy Tappenden is still handling delivery boxes between the six library branches on Tuesday's and Friday's. He has been delivering for twenty years.

...the additional hours for the library employees are funded through the Allen Penal fines. Penal fines are assessments paid by individuals for violation of state law. A traffic fine is the most common violation. Since 1837, it has been constitutionally mandated in Michigan that penal fines be allocated toward the support of public libraries.

...we have over 195 registered borrowers (library card holders) from the Allen community.

...libraries contribute to the quality of life. They are one of those institutions that make a strong community. The Quincy Public Library and Branch District Library System, friends and children who use the library, appreciate the continued interest and support of the Allen community.
