

Quincy Library turns 100!



Visit the Quincy Public Library Sunday, September 19, 2010 from 1-4 p.m. to celebrate our 100 years!

1870 – Ladies of the village formed a Literary Society and collected 400 volumes. The books were kept in private houses and circulated until 1880. The organization disbanded and the books were given to the public school.

1898 – Ladies Library Association was organized, circulating books until they were turned over to the public library.

In **1947**, Quincy Township entered into a contract with the Branch County Library agreeing to become the Quincy Branch of the Branch County Library System. In 1991, Quincy Library became part of the Branch District Library System. The service area of the Quincy Library includes Allen Township in Hillsdale County, which is part of the Quincy School District, as well as all of Branch County.

However, we have retained our individuality by creating our own Foundation so that we can accept and manage the gifts that are given to our library. Our memorial/birthday/special events/projects donation program has been a great way to remember someone special. We have wonderful community support.

The library is still owned and maintained by Quincy Township. With the addition of a lift and renovated restrooms, the library is now handicapped accessible.

The following items were made possible through grants from the DeRoy Testamentary Foundation: new shelving throughout the library, new lighting, a new copier that helps with the printing, collating and stapling of the Friends of the Quincy Library newsletter, office renovation that included uncovering the tin ceiling and grant money toward the lift.

Frozen Strawberry Salad



Beat together cream cheese and sugar. together pineapple thawed strawberries, bananas. Fold both mixtures together. Freeze in 9 X 13 pan. Can be frozen for several weeks. Thaw 1/2 hour before serving.


E-Reader Information
