





# Community Opportunity Worth Mentioning

An opportunity will soon be available for the public to help support the Quincy Courtyard Beautification project and to own a piece of the artist Joel Sanderson.

A tree sculpture will be put in our courtyard this year that will represent Quincy's past, present and future. This piece will be an amazing sculpture and committee is anxious for the public to enjoy it. Future ideas for the courtyard have been discussed, but the beautification can only be funded one step at a time. The Development Downtown Association had a portion of the needed funds to donate, along with the local organizations and other donators.

Courtyard history -- The walls of the old Quincy Hotel came down in April 1973 by a demolition crew of the L.A. Wood Contractors of Quincy. It was believed that the three-story, red brick structure may have been built in the mid 1850s. It was known for many years as the "Quincy House". One of its best known proprietors in the early years of the 20th century, according to a "History of Branch County" published in 1906, was G.J. Fillmore.

The hotel enjoyed a brisk business in the last half of the 19th century as a stagecoach stop for travelers journeying between Detroit and Chicago on the old Chicago Road (US 12). The building changed hands several times during the past 80 years and its most recent proprietors, Mr. and Theodore Blatter, operated restaurant and tavern in a building next to the hotel's former site at 24 East Chicago Street.

The hotel had been unoccupied since November 15, 1971, when it suffered severe smoke and fire damage from a blaze that originated on the third floor.

So it is on this site that our Quincy courtyard has emerged, with a committee working hard to put up the "Spirit of Quincy" arch in recent years. There is difficulty to spur live growth there, but many lovely ideas are in the planning to beautify this area that many can enjoy in our downtown area.

Check the library and area businesses that will have the available art piece and that will also be able to collect your donation toward the project. This will be an exciting time to support our Village.
