

The New York Times Best Seller list was first published over **85** years ago on October 12, 1931. It consisted of five fiction and four non fiction titles for the New York region only. By the early 40s, fourteen cities were included. A national list was created April 9, 1942.

Quincy Newspapers and Publications

The Quincy Herald had the longest continuous history of publication. It was owned and published in 1872 by C.V.R. Pond. The Herald was published continuously until Mr. Zimmerman was taken ill and sold the paper to a Coldwater printer, who suspended publication. The last issue was printed about December 27, 1967.

Another Quincy paper was the Quincy Times published by Mr. A.C. Culver in 1868 to 1878. It was Mr. Culver who gave the name Lakeview Cemetery to the place formerly called "The New Burying Ground." The Times, under another owner discontinued about 1900.

The Literary Reporter was started by C.W. Bennett, the donor of the Quincy Library. This publication continued for about ten years and had a wide circulation in the United States and some foreign countries.

The Quincy News was started by C.H. Young in 1899 and continued publication for a short time. It was more like a magazine in form, style, and contents than a newspaper.

The names of some of the printers and other workers in the Herald office during the years 1918 to 1924 were J. Guy Gilchrist, Miss Grace Alvarado, Linus W. Heydon, Lillian Cole, and a printer by the name of LeFever.

After the Quincy Herald was discontinued, a paper was started by the Business and Professional Women, Chapter of Quincy, named Contact. It was usually an 8 1/2 x 11 inch eight-page paper containing news of the area, and pictures both historical and up-to-date. This newspaper served the Quincy area for four years and it too was discontinued.

The first Contact edition was December 4, 1970 and was well received by locals. Copies were sent to the "boys" in Vietnam and taken out to Quincy patients at Carriage Inn and Maple Lawn. December 1974 saw the final edition of the Contact, due to someone taking the canister collections. Since then, Quincy has had no local news media.

Michigan State Police Turns 100

was intended to only be temporary when it was established in 1917 as a wartime emergency force to provide domestic The Michigan State Troops permanent Force - also known as the Michigan State Constabulary - was created by Governor AlbertSleeper on April 19, 1917. Five troops made up the new force, which had motorized, mounted, and foot units,

...The Michigan State Police Colonel Roy C. Vandercook served as the first commanding officer. After Public Act 26 reorganized the Michigan State Constabulary on March 26, security during World War I. 1919, to make it permanent, the rest, as they say, was history. The force started with 300 troopers. Today, that number is up to 1,065 statewide, which includes 41 new troopers who graduated in December 2016.

It may have started small, but today, the Michigan State police is a leading police agency. Its men and women are committed to keeping Michigan residents safe through the most up-to-date technology and training.

### Look what our library offered in 2016:

Many of the public sit outside our building after hours using the 24/7 available wireless Internet. Our library system is glad to provide this service.

### **Restoration Update:**

Grand River Builders Incorporated Historic Building Restoration worked diligently on our building all fall and finished up the roof work at the end of December. Other work is needed on the building, including the three entrance ways, painting, cement work and the front steps.

\$88, 628.13 has been donated thus far, with a \$60,401 bill being paid out. The estimate for the roof work was originally \$47,000, so we were grateful the billed amount could be covered at that time. The front step work scheduled for this spring has an estimate of \$26,000.

We appreciate the continued support of our community and their efforts to preserve our beautiful 1910 library building. We look forward to seeing many of you at our upcoming fundraiser —
