The next months will still look different in Libraryland. In-house programs will resume eventually, with smaller numbers, but many great programs have and will be rescheduled because we don't want you to miss what we had planned!

DEATH OF COL. POND A Good Man and Honored Citizen Goes to His Reward

News was received in Quincy Sunday of the death at 4:15 that morning of Col. C.V.R. Pond at his home in Lansing, and while it caused universal sadness to his numerous Quincy friends, it was not wholly unexpected, his condition being regarded as quite critical when he visited Quincy the week of Memorial Day, though the end came sooner than was expected.

C.V.R. Pond was born at Auburn, N.Y., May 30, 1936. When a young man he took a course in the Grey Lake Seminary, preparatory to entering the Williams College at Williams, Mass.

He afterwards entered the employ of a hardware firm in New York city, fitting himself for a mercantile life.

Dec. 30, 1958, he was united in marriage to Miss Minnie E. Russell, of Girard, whose acquaintance he formed while she was attending school at the Utica Seminary. Soon after their marriage they went to Hartford, Conn., where he was engaged in the hardware business for a time. While living at Hartford their oldest son, Van R, was born. He was afterwards engaged for a time in the Wood turning and manufacturing business at Union ville, where their second son, George Russell, was born.

Soon after the war of the rebellion broke out Mr. Pond disposed of his business and entered the ranks of the 12th Connecticut Infantry as First Lieutenant, serving under Gen Butler in the Gulf. He was afterwards on detached duty in the Quartermaster Generals department at new Orleans for a considerable time.

After being mustered out of service in the army he joined his family at Coldwater. About 1866 he located in Quincy and for a time was engaged in the hardware business here with his brother-in-law, Mr. Van Blarcum, now of Coldwater. In 1878, Mr. Pond started the Quincy herald, as a republican paper, the first issue being dated Nov. 8, just after the presidential election in which Rutherford B. Hayes was chosen president. His son, George, was associated with him in the newspaper work. In 1879 Mr. Pond was commissioned postmaster, running into his second term, when he resigned. George Pond died May 20, 1884, and in June following the HERALD was sold to F.E. Kittridge. Four years later the paper was sold to Robert J. Stephens.

In 1877 Mr. Pond sold all his interests in Quincy and with his wife went to Arkansas City, Ark., and after a few years' residence in the southwest returned to Coldwater. In 1894 they moved to Lansing. Mr. Pond being appointed chief clerk in the Secretary of State's office under Washington Gardner, which position he resigned to accept the position of Assistant Adjutant General, department of Michigan, G.A.R., which he held for eight years. Eight years ago he was appointed postoffice inspector, which position he held until poor health compelled him to lay aside this work, and a few months ago was given a clerkship in the Lansing postoffice. A slight stroke of paralysis during the past winter left him very feeble and hastened his death. He passed his 76th birthday in Quincy May 30th, two weeks ago today, when he decorated the graves of his loved ones, beside whom he now quietly sleeps in beautiful Lakeview.

Mrs. Pond died at Lansing Oct. 3, 1896, and Oct. 19, 1898 he took for his second wife Mrs. Jennie L. Gibbs, of Lansing, who survives him. He is also survived by one son, Van R. Pond, of Detroit, three grandchildren and one sister.

Mr. Pond has always taken an active interest in the Grand Army and was the first Department Commander of Michigan. He was also a member of Capital Lodge, F.&A.M., and O.E.S., at Lansing.

Much might be said, did time and space permit, in praise of Mr. Pond in the various walks of life, he always taking an active part in everything to promote the best interests of Quincy, this being the dearest spot to him on earth, and he was held in the highest esteem by our people.

The remains arrived here from Lansing on the 12:28 train yesterday, accompanied by his widow, her two sons, W.D. Gibbs, of Detroit, E.D. Gibbs, of Lansing, and Van R. Pond and wife, of Detroit. C.O. Loomis post, of which deceased was a member and past commander, escorted the remains to Commercial Hotel, where they were viewed by many of our citizens before proceeding to the cemetery, where the Post took charge of the burial. About forty veterans were in line, including seven past department commanders.

In behalf of the citizens of Quincy, Mr. O.M. Bowen, of the law firm of Lockerby & Bowen, paid the following beautiful tribute to Col. Pond:

FRIENDS: This is not the time of place for the utterance of eulogistic words. In the presence of death, we stand humbled with reverential silence. No tongue is rich enough in eloquent phrasing, or no wealth of words is adequate to paint in language the tender sentiments of the heart.

As friends, comrades and citizens, we beg the tribute of this brief moment to bear the token of our respect to Col. Pond, the gentleman, the soldier, and the friend of man. The long span of his active and well rounded years touches with kindly recollections almost three generations in this community. In the attributes of manhood, citizenship, and neighborly kindness, we knew him as possessing the rich and rare qualities of generousness and loyalty. Dutiful in his country's service, loyal and sacrificing in citizenship, lovable and generous as a friend, we shall ever cherish the record of his life as one squared by those abiding principles of optimism and honor that alone make a man worthy of remembrance. He was one of that valiant school of enthusiasts that in an earlier period of this village did much to establish the institutions and privileges we now enjoy.

As one from among a younger generation of men, I shall venture the assertion that in his time and generation no other man served this community more loyally or generously. In the days of the ancient Roman republic, it was the proud boast that wherever is a Roman citizen, there is Rome. It may be as truthfully said of Col. Pond, in his passionate love and loyalty for Quincy, in the spirit of willing service that exemplified his every act, that wheresoever he might be the interests of the town he loved were both well guarded and advanced. For years he was the leading spirit in the advancement and upbuilding of this community, and after his removal from here he returned yearly to greet his comrades and his friends. No other spot, under the whole circle of the sun, he loved so dearly as the village of Quincy.

Two weeks ago tomorrow, on Decoration Day, I saw a soldier with whitened hair, aged and inform, and upon whose brow the breath of the eternal morning was already breaking, standing at the soldier's salute, as his Grand Army Post passed him in the street below. He comes now to sleep with comrades in the land he loved, under the flag he served, rich in honors, rich in years, with every duty done and every function filled...The floral display was most profuse and beautiful, including a G.A.R. piece from post No. 2. The grave and surroundings were decorated with red, white and blue bunting and the large flag was draped over arch entrance to cemetery. During the exercises the business houses were all closed, as a mark of respect to the departed.

Mrs. Pond and other members of the family wish through the Herald to express their sincere thanks to the good people of Quincy for their many acts of kindness and the sympathy shown them in their deep sorrow.



Did You Know ??




