JILLIAN DOES IT AGAIN

Jillian Rick presented her third arts and crafts project for elementary age children on Saturday, August 6, 2011. It was the first ever arts and crafts project in the new library. Children took a piece of poster board and covered it with different colors of crayons and then painted it with a secret recipe consisting of washable black Tempura paint and detergent. After the paint dried, the children etched colorful drawings in the black surface. Here is an example.



While the children waited for the paint to dry, Jillian demonstrated the electronic books (e-book) web site, Tumble Books. The children can access books geared toward their grade level, K-8, and read the books or listen to the books. The web site can be access from your own computer or at the library. Go to http://www.branchdistrictlibrary.org/ and click on the Tumble books logo on the right hand side.



Jillian's next project is in two parts starting September 10th at 10 AM. She will show the children, elementary through middle school how to knit using a prepared spool and yarn. This simple knitting system allows the children to make a long knitted rope they can take home to continue working until part two of the project the next month. In October, she will show the participants how to "cast off" their rope and form it into a hot pad or a pad for a vase on the table. A sample of the project is on display at the library. Interested people, including adults, should register for the class at the library to ensure there are sufficient supplies on hand for everyone. This class is presented at no cost by the Friends of the Library.

NEW BOOKS AT THE LIBRARY

BONES by Jan Burke. An Irene Kelly Mystery. What really happened to Julia Sayre? She disappeared four years ago. A young mother of two, Sayre was more than a news story to reporter Irene Kelly. When Sayre's family sought Irene's help, the search became a personal mission—and a fruitless one.

THE BOURNE DOMINION by Robert Ludlum. Jason Bourne is searching for an elusive cadre of terrorists planning to destroy America's most strategic natural resources. He needs the help of his long-time friend, General Boris Karpov, the newly appointed head of Russia's most feared spy agency.

<u>SUNSET BRIDGE</u> by Emilie Richards, A Happiness Key Novel. Sunset Bridge is the third book in a trilogy about the lives of four women living in a small community in Florida.

MICHAEL 1958-2009. This book presents the life and times of Michael Jackson in full color pictures from the Jackson 5 to his final year.

ESCAPE by Barbara Delinsky. Emily Aulenbach is 32, a lawyer married to a lawyer, living and working in Manhattan. An idealist, she had once dreamed of representing victims of corporate abuse, and signed on with a firm that promised this, but it hasn't worked out. *Escape* is the story of the dreams we have and the heart-breaking task of giving up the parts that don't work, salvaging those that do, and creating new dreams for what lies ahead.


KID'S KORNER JEOPARDY WITH DR. SEUSS
